

The "Jane Austen Industry" is a massive global phenomenon transforming the author's 19th-century novels into a modern, multi-million dollar "brand"

Acknowledged that Jane Austen continues to grow in popularity as an author even as her novels turn 200 years old. After Shakespeare, many would pronounce Austen the most popular and widely acclaimed literary figure in history. Her six novels are some of the most widely read literature in the world often outselling the books of top contemporary authors. According to Nielsen BookScan research, for example, in 2002 U.S. book stores sold 110,000 copies of *Pride and Prejudice* while John Grisham's, *The Runaway Jury*, (a #1 best seller in 1996) sold 73,337 copies. Further, in recent years there have been numerous new editions of her books, various translations, dozens of TV adaptations and feature films, in addition to prequels, sequels and spin-offs, as well as, new biographies and articles on Austen herself.

Notoriety was gained essentially by word of mouth. While she did not promote herself, her brother, Henry, did. Henry, along with her sister, Cassandra, were her biggest supporters. Henry played several roles. At the time of the publishing of her novels he was a successful London banker. Because her first novel *Sense and Sensibility* was published on commission Austen needed to come up with the money to have it published. Having no money of her own she depended on Henry's financial support to bring her books into the reading world. He not only provided financial support where needed but also acted as a liaison with her publishers. In the early 1800's it was very much a man's world. Henry assisted his sister by helping her navigate the professional world.

- **Screen Adaptations:** Continued success of film and TV adaptations, from the 1995 *Pride and Prejudice* to modern reinterpretations and biopics like *Miss Austen*.
- **Merchandise & Tourism:** Extensive commercial goods, including Regency-style fashion, tea sets, and branded items. Tourism focuses on her home in Chawton and Bath.
- **Literary & Fan Culture:** A thriving market of sequels, spin-offs, and "Austen-adjacent" fiction.
- **Societies & Scholarship:** Active academic and fan organizations, such as the [Jane Austen Society UK](#) and the Jane Austen Society of North America (JASNA), publish ongoing scholarship.

The Jane Austen Centre in Bath is a permanent exhibition located on Gay Street, celebrating the author's time in the city (1801–1806) and the Regency period that inspired her work. It features costumed actors, a waxwork of Austen, and Regency-themed tea rooms.
